### PUTTING ARTISTS AT THE CENTRE

2021 was about putting artists at the centre of Orana Arts, with a new strategic direction launched into the world on the back of much planning in previous years that aims to reshape our regional arts organisation as one responding to the needs of regional artists across NSW. Those needs were expressed directly to us through artist surveys and consultations, as well as various sector studies. By taking an artist-led approach, we're developing opportunities for regionally-based artists of all ages, artforms, and stages in their career. Many of those implemented in 2021 are outlined in this report.

Supporting the new direction and programs has been a new funding agreement with the NSW Government through Create NSW, that has seen our funding increased. We have been determined to see this increased funding go into our programs, in turn benefiting the artists and organisations we're working with.

Our key focus has been consolidating three platform areas:—The Studio/ Studio Co!Lab, Volunteers Artists

Museums Program (VAMP), and Creative Consultancy, developing opportunities within each platform, and establishing partnerships to deliver them.

A new logo for the organisation, branding key platforms and programs, and a new purpose-built website expresses our commitment to putting artists at the centre and being a hub of information and resources. Our Studio Co!Lab members even have their own members' area on the website, where member-specific opportunities, resources and links are housed.

The team behind the changes includes both our board and staff. They have put a lot of work into advising and guiding the organsanisation over the past few years. We welcomed new board member, Aunty Ruth Carney through the year as our co-opted board member, Judith James stepped back. Aunty Ruth has long been a supporter of our work with young people, Indigenous story-telling and our performing arts programs.

We could never have made the changes without our staff this past year. There were some movements within the team as we farewelled key members, Michelle Hall and Danielle Andrews. Both were critical to our general operations and the success of our production of *A Little Piece of Heaven*—the Uncle Dick and Aunt Ruth Carney touring stage show about their love and life in regional NSW.

We also welcomed Andrew Glassop into the team in 2021, as Manager of Partnerships and Engagement. Based in Sydney but with intimate knowledge of the regions, Andrew is an enormous asset to Orana Arts as we continue to forge partnerships with governments and peak arts organisations, as well as raising awareness of the strengths of the regional arts sector in the wider conversation.

2021 has been an enormous year for our little organsiation, but we do punch above our weight, particularly in the face of adversity. We proved we have the skills and capacity to flex as needed to meet the needs of the creatives we represent.


### GRANT FUND DISTRIBUTION IN 2021

### Our support across the arts


(as a percentage of project funding)

### THE STUDIO









THE STUDIO is our artist-centred platform, where we connect with regionally based artists of all ages, stages and art forms. Content developed through The Studio includes creative and professional development opportunities and resources. It also includes an events program and the membership platform, Studio delivering Co!Lab, focused on exclusive opportunities, funding, information, support for collaborations between and members.

In 2021, The Studio supported and showcased projects funded through Arts Restart grants from Create NSW, one of the three residency programs offered to non-member artists, along with a place to non-members interested within the Mudgee Art House giclée print offer. Also part of The Studio was the Studio Co!Lab Talks program rolled out between April and December 2021, delivering 19 artist talks, and the opening of the Orana Arts online shop.

The Studio also offers support for our performing arts for young people program, Not a Dress Rehearsal (NaDR), sharing resources and talks with NaDR members when relevant.





# PO LAB

STUDIO CO!LAB members get access to even more from The Studio for their annual fee (paid monthly in 2021). By the end of the year we had about 65 members of Studio Co!Lab from across the performing arts, writing and visual arts, working from the Northern Tablelands, Mid North Coast, Newcastle/Hunter, Shoalhaven, Central West and Riverina. As well as having access to quarterly creative development grants exclusive to members, they also had access to all three residency programs — inScribe (for writers), Co!Lab @ CORRIDOR AIR (for a writer, performing artist and visual artist), and the Ironbark Artist Residency (visual artists).

Along with these opportunities, Studio Co!Lab members get exclusive resources including video and audio recordings of the Studio Co!Lab Talks, grant writing and marketing assistance, and speaking opportunities. The group is supported by a dedicated Facebook Group and monthly ebulletins, as well as e-blasts as needed.

The development of programs for The Studio has seen partnerships developed with Mudgee Art House, Writing NSW, the CORRIDOR project, and Stuart Town Advancement Association.

This was NOT A DRESS REHEARSAL's (NaDR) first full year of operations, and we had young people join us from Scotts Head to Sussex Inlet, Coonabarabran to Wagga Wagga, and Nyngan to Goulburn, taking a major step in fulfilling their passion for the performing arts. It was a difficult year, and yet those who stayed with the program picked up opportunities to develop leadership skills through our Ambassador Program, learn more about the industry from those working in it, as well as craft skills that will not only help them in the performing arts, but in whatever they pursue in life.

The experience and care our delivery partners, Australian Theatre for Young People (ATYP) and Taikoz have shown, has been outstanding. It's been a partnership that has brought enormous benefit to all involved.

- Our Taiko Ensemble, who rehearsed together online, won the percussion section of the <u>Dubbo Eisteddfod</u> in their first public performance.
- Jezikiah Brown was awarded the inaugural Richard Carney Scholarship for Aboriginal Youth in the program.
- We supported several young people with auditions and HSC performances
- International dancer/choreographer and Dubbo local, Charlie Bartley dropped into the program a couple of times to talk with our Ambassadors and offer some insights into the performing arts.

### **VOLUNTEERS. ARTISTS. MUSEUMS.PROGRAM**

VOLUNTEERS. ARTISTS. MUSEUMS. PROGRAM (VAMP) seeks to find new ways to build connections and audiences for volunteer museums. An audit of resources, needs and opportunities helps guide the direction of the museum program.

The program has a strong focus on encouraging creative producers to find ways to engage with audiences and provide avenues of interaction for the community. It also builds partnerships with local government agencies in restoring community confidence and resilience.

VAMP took centre stage at Gulgong at the end of the year after the first Heritage Artist Residency (HARd) was completed over winter at the Henry Lawson Centre by artist, Fiona MacDonald (Ilford). Fiona (pictured right) spent time delving into the archives of the Centre to unearth the stories of the women who surrounded the iconic Australian bush writer, Henry Lawson. The work took shape in an exhibition called *The Dawn Club* that was exhibited at the Henry Lawson Centre until the end of January 2022.

## CREATIVE CONSULTANCY





Orana Arts continued to work in partnership with Sydney Trains (Transport for NSW) into 2021, in a collaboration between artists, Sydney Trains and Orana Arts, to celebrate the 140-year history of the Stuart Town Railway Station and the special heritage of the station. This project included commissioning a public artwork on the railway station site, and video documentation of the project, paid for by Sydney Trains.

The public artwork, titled *On the Night Train*, by Stuart Town's resident artist, Tim Winters was unveiled in a ceremony in June 2021, along with interpretive signage that recognises the Indigenous connection and history to the area and design work by Wellington-based graphic designer, Louise Austin. A QR coded link to the video produced by content producer, Kim V. Goldsmith was also accessible on the signage.

This project is an example of how Orana Arts can oversee creative solutions for organisations like Sydney Trains, utilising the creative skills of artists within the region to deliver an outcome.

The organisation continues to work with Government and other agencies to deliver projects that celebrate the talent and creativity of regionally-based artists, yet meets the needs of the client organisation.


