FROM THE CHAIR DIANE MCARTHUR

Artists have played a significant role in our society, providing historical context, promoting expression and creativity, evoking healthy and thoughtful cultural discussion, and translating experiences across space and time. In short, art helps us survive and thrive.

The past few years have been challenging for everyone, particularly regional artists and cultural organisations. During the COVID pandemic, we saw the closure of art spaces, galleries, theatres and museums, significantly affecting the lives of regional artists. Not only were regional artists isolated physically and socially, but their ability to earn a living was also greatly affected, and, in many cases, their income ceased.

But this is a good news story. Over the past year, we have seen a significant positive shift in the regional arts and cultural sector, and life appears to be returning to a new normal. Invitations to exhibition openings and cultural events are arriving regularly, offering opportunities to get out, network, socialise, and experience art and performance firsthand.

As you read this annual report, you'll note that there has been a substantial increase in opportunities offered to regionally-based artists of all ages, stages and genres over the year in the form of grants, residencies and professional development, exponential growth in Studio Co!Lab memberships, and increased traffic to our website from across our digital platforms, as we maintain an active and targeted audience for our communications.

Additionally, and perhaps our most significant announcement is that **Orana Arts has been** granted \$507,107 in addition to its core funding of \$217,000. We have some exciting philanthropic opportunities coming in 2023, and we will be promoting our **Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status**.

None of this could have occurred without the dedication, commitment and unrelenting passion for the arts, shown by our team. Over 10 years, our Executive Director Alicia Rodriguez Leggett, has raised the profile of regional creatives across Central West NSW and Regional NSW, nationally, and more recently, internationally.

Manager of Partnerships and Engagement for Orana Arts, Andrew Glassop has also worked tirelessly to grow stakeholder investments to ensure that regional artists are provided with professional development opportunities, are valued and seen as agents of change, and are given the opportunity to challenge expectations.

Alicia and Andrew are supported by a team that brings much-needed skills to our small but very effective regional arts organisation. Amanda Donohue, Georgie Saunders and contractors Kim V. Goldsmith, and Camilla Ward make up the team that gets everything done. And special mention to our dedicated bookkeeper Greg Vaughan for his attention to all things financial. Finally, to our Board of Directors, who provide much-needed advice and support throughout the year—thank you.



FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ALICIA LEGGETT

We are staying true to our mission when we transitioned from a service organisation to strategic and project based program, that celebrates the creatives in the regions, as well addressing the gaps in opportunities and growth in the sector.

The team closed the year with news of our successful application with the Stronger Country

Communities Fund, supporting the cultural infrastructure for the Maliyan Cultural Centre in Wellington NSW. Cementing the path for our partnership and collaboration with Wellington Local Aboriginal Land Council that began with discussions in 2020.



Working with the Australian Theatre for Young People (ATYP) and Percussion Australia (Taikoz) has extended the work we can do for young people in the region.

MEETING THE NEEDS OF REGIONAL CREATIVES

2022 was a year of consolidation for YOUNG PEOPLE SHARING THEIR Orana Arts on the back of the previous year's change in strategic direction. We were keen to ensure our three key platform areas-The Studio, Volunteer Artists Museums Program (VAMP) and the Creative Consultancy, remain the keystones to our offering with the mission of creating equitable opportunities for regional artists and cultural organisations across NSW. Our target for these platforms are:

- · Regionally-based creatives and young people;
- · Independent community museums in the regions;
- · Organisations and agencies working in the regions requiring cultural advice and expertise.

HIGHLIGHTS

GROWING STUDIO CO!LAB MEMBERSHIP

2022 highlighted the needs of regionally-based creatives through strong growth in the Studio Co!Lab membership platform, indicating our offering is appealing to artists seeking opportunities through residencies, funding through our small grants programs, and professional development, conversations and connections.

STORIES THROUGH DRAMA

Also falling under The Studio is our performing arts for regional youth program, Not a Dress Rehearsal (NaDR). In Term 3 2022, we ran a school holiday workshop at Trangie Central School, in partnership with Australian Theatre for Young People (ATYP), where students learned skills and techniques to creatively share their own stories. They used the published and performed story of local Elders, Richard and Ruth Carney, A Little Piece of Heaven as a resource in the workshops. The students were so engaged by this experience, several had the confidence to apply for the Summer Drama Camp at the end of the year. Participating student, Ashton Davis was also awarded the **Richard Carney Memorial** Scholarship, providing him with a trip to Sydney to visit and work with ATYP.

JAPANESE DRUMMING IN THE REGIONS

Distance and access make it challenging for young people wanting to learn about other cultures and develop performance stagecraft from professionals in the sector. Our continuing partnership with **Taikoz** over the past year has continued to guide and develop our taiko drumming ensemble, **Kumi Taiko**. Our investment in drums for the group, and ongoing discussions with organisations with an interest in Japanese culture in the regions, secured the ensemble several performance opportunities in 2022—at the Matsuri Festival in Cowra and the 20th Anniversary of the Shoyoen Japanese Gardens in Dubbo.

RE-IMAGINING LOCAL HISTORIES

The Volunteers. Artists. Museums. Program (VAMP) continues to address the pressing needs of small, community and volunteer-run museums across our regions. With limited capacity to make the improvements needed within their collections, our artist residency programs—Heritage Artist Residency (HARd) and enCounter, have provided museum staff and volunteers the chance to reexamine their collections through the eyes of artists, who have been inspired to create works that tell the stories of our communities from a different perspective. This has brought new audiences through the doors and created renewed interest in local histories.





Australia's leading Indigenous and intercultural dance theatre company, **Marrugeku** and Orana Arts partnered in 2022 to bring Marrugeku's unique dance vision to the Central West of NSW, introducing participants to the way Marrugeku uses improvisational movement processes to generate theatre and exchange stories and experiences. Workshops and excerpt solo performances were held in **Coonabarabran** and **Wellington**.

Co!Lab @ CORRIDOR AIR

is a residency partnership between Orana Arts' Studio Co!Lab and the CORRIDOR project (tCp) at Cowra for Studio Co!Lab members. Since 2021, five artists have spent time at tCp thinking about their practice and developing ideas for new work. It's for visual artists, performing artists and writers.

INNOVATIVE PROGRAMMING WITH STATEWIDE IMPACT

Five years ago, a couple of national studies showed the impact of the arts in the regions was as significant as it is in metropolitan Australia; more than two-thirds of survey participants engaged in online arts activity, but artists living in regions earned almost a third less from their creative work than their city cousins, feeling their location contributed negatively to their practice. Since then, we've had a pandemic. Our programming aims to address these issues directly.

STUDIO CO!LAB MEMBERS IN THE SPOTLIGHT.

Our platforms and programs are designed to create equitable opportunities for regional artists and cultural organisations across NSW—filling gaps in delivery and offerings. This has underpinned our member-based Studio Co!Lab offerings, such as residencies, grants and professional development resources, but the real innovation has been establishing a regular, monthly online Studio Co!Lab Talks program, providing a place and space for regionallybased artists and audiences to learn more about the experiences of artists, their processes and practices. In 2022, this regular, accessible, program grew in audience attendance and the

breadth of topics covered, putting member artists in the limelight to share their knowledge and findings, providing an opportunity for creatives across NSW to connect, learn, exchange and grow in their practices without the tyrannies of distance and time constraints. For some speakers this was a paid opportunity.

REGIONAL FUTURES CROSS-REGION CONVERSATIONS.

Rarely are artists consciously made part of the conversation about planning for the future. Through the Create NSW funded Regional Futures project - an initiative of the Regional Arts Network, 29 regionally-based artists from across NSW were commissioned to explore what the future of the regions will look like. We took the brief one step further, forming a partnership with Arts Mid North Coast and Dubbo Regional Council, to commission

four artists to explore the topic in light of renewable energy developments in the regions and targets of a net-zero economy by 2050. The artists spent time in each other's regions, met with knowledge specialists and each other, and shared their findings through the Studio Co!Lab Talks program. The group were offered an exhibition at the Manning Regional Art Gallery in Taree, for early 2023. The next stage of Regional Futures will provide an opportunity for the regional artists involved to present their work in Western Sydney through an exhibition and symposium at Casula Powerhouse, where the Statewide conversation will continue.

TIME TO SHINE (NaDR).

With the fallout from COVID still impacting the ability to deliver accessible yet meaningful performing arts skill development to young people in the regions in 2022, most of our drama/theatre planning went into creating a summer drama camp opportunity for the summer holidays at the end of the year that would give young people time to shine. This was done in partnership with Australian Theatre for Young People (ATYP).

The five-day camp at Lake Burrendong was oversubscribed by the time EOIs closed, with applications from across NSW—from Byron Bay to Bathurst, Gunnedah to Trangie, Leeton as well as closer to Orana Arts HQ, Dubbo, Narromine and Wellington, all passionate about their need for this opportunity. The camp was held in January 2023.

DRUMMING UP PERFORMANCES (KUMI TAIKO).

The Kumi Taiko Japanese drumming ensemble, supported by Taikoz, continued to grow and develop through performance opportunities in 2022, which provided this group of young people from the regions the opportunity to reach a wider audience and learn from more experienced percussion performers, by attending the BOOM International Festival of Percussion in Sydney, and giving performances at the Matsuri Festival at Cowra Japanese Gardens in Cowra and anniversary celebrations at Shoyoen Garden in Dubbo.

MUSEUM STORYTELLING REVISITED

Our VAMP platform is one of the most innovative offerings we have as there is no one specifically addressing the needs of the regional independent community museum sector in Regional NSW. In 2022, VAMP saw the Heritage Artists Residency (HARd) project, started in 2021, finalised with work developed and presented at Mudgee Museum with Wiradjuri artist Josh Yasserie, working with guest curator, Nathan Sentance from the Powerhouse Museum. This prompted a conversation about how the way museums tell stories must change.

CROSS REGION COLLABORATION

VAMP's offering in 2022 also included a new project - enCounter, an initiative of Orana Arts, supported by South East Arts, Arts Mid North Coast and West Darling Arts, networking to bring creative practitioners together from across the NSW to work, collaborate and share. enCounter saw us working with on residencies at museums in Trangie and Gilgandra, and a mentored writers' program. The cross-region support attracted regionally-based writers and artists from across the State. The results of this project will be unveiled in early 2023.

PARTNERSHIPS TO BENEFIT REGIONAL COMMUNITES

Our partnerships with agencies and cultural organisations across NSW extend our reach into areas where we can utilise the skills and talents of our member artists, and/or use our professional expertise to provide advice and project management services.

In 2022, on the back of a successful creative community project with artist, Dennis Golding, we were able to assist the Maliyan Cultural Centre in Wellington access a Create NSW Creative Capital Program grant to fit out their exhibition space at the Centre. With additional money for programming in coming years, this will be a drawcard for creatives from across the State to come to Wellington to work with and learn from the community and share their skills in the process.





2022 Country Arts Support Program (CASP)

2022 Country Arts Support Program (CASP) funded projects included filmmaking, community storytelling, a soundscape composition collaboration and soundwalking, community art workshops and ballet performances in Sydney. The \$17,000 of CASP funding went to individuals and groups in Dubbo **Regional Council and** Warrumbungle Shire Council LGAs, and to Studio Co!Lab members. CASP is an annual small grants program funded by Create NSW and administered by Orana Arts.




INVESTING IN CREATIVE REGIONS

Our investment in the creative regions of NSW is central to what we do as an organisation. In 2022, major investment of funding and staff resources was strategically spent on **First Nations** projects, **youth** programming and **independent**, **community-run museums**.

Our **Studio Co!Lab** members were beneficiaries through our investment in small grant offerings, residencies, and our team's time on developing professional development resources and supporting grant applications. **Local Government** members had access to small grants such as the Country Arts Support Program (CASP), investment in key projects and targeted events in their LGAs, for example, Murrugeku dance workshops and performances.

2023 will continue the investment into these key areas, and significantly in First Nations creative and community development in partnership with Wellington Local Aboriginal Land Council on creative programming for the Maliyan Cultural Centre in Wellington.
